

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### **Word from the Minister**

### **Dear Friends**

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women came to the tomb, taking the spices they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in they did not find the body. (Luke 24 vv 1-3)

On 4th February earlier this year a team of scientist confirmed that a skeleton that had lain beneath a car park near Grey Friars Church in Leicester was that of King Richard III who was killed at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485. The confirmation came after an extensive search for the historic and controversial king's final resting place.

Christian Faith is founded however on a tomb and a resting place where no physical body was found, a discovery that initially led to bewilderment on the part of the women and the disciples but then joy when the risen Jesus met them. In the 1930s Frank Morison, an English journalist wrote a book entitled 'Who Moved The Stone?' In the book Morison described how he himself had started out as a skeptic, but had come finally to a point of faith and belief. He reminded his readers that the evidence of the empty tomb points to the resurrection. The women and the disciples could not have taken the body for soon they would boldly proclaim that Jesus was risen and would lay down their lives for this assertion. The authorities could not have taken the body for they would have quickly produced it to quell this infant movement and the people who came to be called 'Christians'. Thieves could not have taken the body either for the tomb was well guarded. The transformation in the disciples is really only explained by the reality of what is described in the Gospels – Jesus appeared to them risen from the dead.

Yet we also recognize we live by faith and not by sight. We are assured by Jesus own words to Thomas ... 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed'. And over 2000 years we have seen the Risen Jesus speak to the hearts of countless men and women and He continues to change and transform lives today. In this way people still meet with Jesus. So let us praise God in these weeks that follow Easter. Our King is not waiting to be found in some ancient hewn rock somewhere near Jerusalem.

He left that cold stone tomb long ago and is alive that we with Him may conquer death, that we with Him and by the help of the Holy Spirit whom he promised to be our Helper, may continue to do the work of his kingdom here on earth, in order that all may receive the Good News and come to have life in all its fullness. In the words of the Nicene Creed a statement of Christian Faith from the 4<sup>th</sup> Century:

For our sake He was crucified under Pontius Pilate; He suffered death and was buried. On the third day He rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; He ascended into Heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His kingdom will have no end.

The blessings of our Risen and Living King, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ be ever with you and at work through and among us and in our world.

The peace and hope of this Easter Season ...

It is intended the meeting will last approximately an hour and will then be followed by a Faith Supper. Both Church Members and adherents are welcome to attend.





## The best position for prayer

Three theologians at a conference centre sat discussing the best positions for prayer, while a telephone repairman worked nearby. "Kneeling is definitely best," claimed one, and backed up his claim by quoting a number of texts on humility in Greek.

"No," another contended. "I get the best results standing with my hands outstretched to Heaven." He quoted a few texts on praise in Latin.

"You're both wrong," the third insisted. "The most effective prayer position is lying prostrate, face down on the floor." He quoted a few texts on penitence in Hebrew.

The repairman could contain himself no longer. "Hey, fellas," he interrupted, "the best prayin' I ever did was in English, hangin' upside down from a telephone pole."

### **The Cup**

Young Charlie enjoyed Bible stories. On Sunday mornings he was a member of a children's group and heard how God was involved with people such as Moses, Joshua and King David. Charlie also liked learning about Jesus. One Sunday, his class finished slightly earlier than all the others. Charlie was the first child to leave the room and went into the main worship area, to wait for the closing songs and prayers with all the children and teachers. On his way to sit in a pew, he passed a table which was usually bare except for a hymn book and a Bible. But this time the table was covered with a white cloth, and one of the teachers was positioning a large silver cup alongside a plateful of bread.

Charlie didn't realise that this was a Communion Table. He saw the cup and thought a church sports team had won a prize in a recent competition. As far as he was concerned this chalice was like the football trophy given to winners of a football tournament. So, in his innocence Charlie asked, "Who's won?"

The reply came immediately from the elderly teacher "Christ has won!" The answer came as a surprise. It was not what he had expected.

During the closing session, Charlie watched and listened as the bread and wine were described as symbols for the body and blood of Jesus. It was a lot to understand, but as Charlie grew up within the church family, that moment became clearer. Jesus had indeed won! He had died, arose from the grave and was now victorious over death.

The Cup we use at Communion is a reminder that Jesus died for our sins. He came to give us Life in all its fullness. Jesus has won the fight over evil and lives for evermore.

Jesus said: "This cup is God's new covenant, sealed with my blood. Whenever you drink it, do so in memory of me." (1 Corinthians 11:25)

## **Don't stop fidgeting**

Fidgeting could help prolong your life. Watching television or working on computers for hours on end can actually shorten your lifespan and raise the risk of conditions like heart disease and stroke. Experts advise that we break up our 'sitting time' throughout the day by walking around to stretch our legs, or bounce on our heels, or stand and sway and wiggle our hips (though perhaps not all at once, in the middle of the office!). Try and get more than 150 minutes of moderate to vigorous exercise a week. So advises medical experts from the NHS, who recommend you move about every half hour or so.

His joy, his justice, love and praise.


