# Word from the Minister

Dear Friends...

Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me and your right hand will hold me fast. (Psalm 139 vv 7-10).

Holidays are precious things and in the middle of June I had opportunity to take a week's break in Yorkshire. Across the week I spent some time on the Yorkshire Dales, then in Whitby and finally in York. In Whitby I spent one day meandering through the village with its tiny streets, touring the museum commemorating the discoverer James Cook who acquired his sailing skills as an apprentice in the town and walking the grounds of the ruined abbey founded by St. Hilda in 657AD. After all this activity I then set out at 4.00pm to walk the six and a half mile stretch of coastline between Whitby and Robin Hood's Bay, a walk that took just under three hours. The weather was reasonably kind and I must have past no more than a handful of people heading in the other direction.

About the halfway point on this walk I came across a bench on the footpath dedicated to a husband and wife who had farmed the land that bordered part of this coast. It was a welcome point of rest and for a while I was able to sit and just be lost in the peace and presence of God as I enjoyed the view. I could also look at least a mile either way up and down the coastline and realized I was in complete isolation. There was, in that moment, that sense of just being alone with God away from the noise and demands of the world and spiritually refreshed I was able to set off on my way again arriving in Robin Hood's Bay to enjoy what I saw as a well earned fresh fish meal in a local establishment (a nice salmon salad for those who wish the detail) before catching the bus back to Whitby.

Two days later in York attending the Sunday Service and Sung Eucharist in York Minster the curate in his sermon spoke on how we have all come from God and are also journeying to God. I was struck by this after my walk a few days earlier reflecting that on any journey what is behind you gets smaller in the distance whilst what is before you draws ever nearer and more visible. If God who is eternal is ever both behind us and before us then wherever we are in life's journey we may take comfort in knowing God is with us and that He may be seen and known. It would also be true to say that His peace and presence and power in our lives never diminish but just become experienced and viewed from different perspectives. The Psalmist and author of Psalm 139 knew this and expressed it so beautifully. May such a realization also strengthen and bless each every one of us. Finally, may I wish you all equal blessing wherever you may spend some time during this holiday and summer season, time I hope to renew oneself in body, mind and spirit. I finish with the final words of Psalm 139 surely one of the most beautiful passages in the Bible and a Psalm you may wish to reflect upon through the Summer.

Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting. (Psalm 139 vv 23 & 24)

# **Methodist Conference**

This year's Methodist Conference, the body of elected representatives from around the country who gather annually to review, govern and determine the life of the Methodist Church will be taking place at Methodist Central Hall in Westminster, London from 4 - 11 July. The Conference is a gathering of 306 representatives drawn from each Methodist district, along with some who have been elected by the Conference, together with some ex officio members, and international, ecumenical and youth representatives. It is the governing body of the Methodist Church and meets annually to discuss matters affecting the life of the Church, the nation and the world.

Live video of the main Conference debates will be streamed <u>online</u> and people can watch the debates later through the Conference website too. There will also be regular Conference updates on Twitter (#methconf) and Facebook. Key events and issues for debate include:

### Saturday 6 July

Induction of the president (Ruth Gee) and vice-president (Daleep Mukarji) of the Conference / The president's address and the vice-president's address / Report by the general secretary, the Revd Dr Martyn Atkins / Report from the Church's Children's and Youth Assembly

### Sunday 7 July

Conference Worship and Ordination of Methodist ministers in venues across London

#### **Monday 8 July**

Supporting ministers with ill health / Same-sex marriage working party proposals (A response to the legislation going through parliament)

#### **Tuesday 9 July**

Future mission together (Methodist Missionary Society Report) / Discipleship and Ministries Learning Network

#### Wednesday 10 July

Address by Archbishop of Canterbury

# Church Anniversary 2013

This was a "Do it yourself anniversary", involving our own Mr Wesley's Preachers and we couldn't have asked for better.

Morning worship, included a parade and was ably led by Vron Jackson, who was assisted by Eleanor Bakker, (who is in training as a Worship Leader). Vron cleverly wove together a celebration of Father's day, with the elements needed to build and sustain the church at Hanham. Her adaption of the 3 Little Pigs story of house building, led us onto what are the true foundations of a Church. At the end, the congregation were invited to put a red paper heart onto a representation of our present building, to show that the Church is cemented together with love.

Eleanor used her "Messy Church" skills to encourage us to sing with full actions the song about the biblical story of building houses on rock & sand.

At the evening service, Glen led worship and included her own interpretation of what it would have been like to be a female Local Preacher in Wesley's day and how living in this area, she would have had first hand knowledge of his preaching to the miners. Arnold gave us a synopsis of the "Living memory" history of the two churches (High Street & Ebenezer), which make up Hanham Methodist Church today; while Colin reiterated some of Arnold's comments and gave us a reading from 2 Kings 2012-15. It tells the story of how a king of Babyylon, Merodach-baladan, visited Hezekiah, king of Judah, and was shown all his treasures. Tim then expounded on this reading, relating it to our own experiences.

I think that the day proved, if we were in any doubt, that we have a great deal of talent within our Church, which perhaps we do not always recognise, and I personally came away feeling that we had truly worshipped.

ON JOY and SORROW

When you are joyous, look deep into your heart and you shall find it is only that which has given you sorrow that is giving you joy.

When you are sorrowful look again in your heart, and you shall see that in truth you are weeping for that which has been your delight.

Some say 'Joy is greater than sorrow', and others say 'Nay sorrow is the greater. But I say unto you , they are inseparable.

My aunt was a florist and at the end of a day she would recount stories of people who had come into the shop. Maybe a young bride excitedly choosing her bouquet or perhaps a bereaved family arranging flowers for a funeral of a loved one. Another day there might be a nervous husband wanting to mark his first wedding anniversary with a gift of flowers for his wife or a young child with only a few pennies to spend for Mothering Sunday.

All human life can pass through a florist's shop as flowers are used to mark the joys and sorrows of life. The words of The Prophet remind us how closely joy and sorrow sit alongside each other within our hearts. To find joy we need to become involved with others and that will almost inevitably cause sorrow at some point. Yet who would pass up the experience of a joyful relationship in order to avoid the sorrow that will ensue when it ends.

St. Paul writing to the church in Rome tells his readers to 'Rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep' (Romans 12:15). There is much sorrow and many joys in the world and indeed in our community. As followers of Jesus we are charged to get alongside people to share their sorrows and there joys. And from my experience doing that can bring true joy to ourselves
