


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Word from the Minister

Dear Friends...

'Let us love one another for love comes from God' (1 John 4 v 7)

I want to begin my letter this month by thanking everyone for their contribution both at Harvest and for their support of Messy Church and our new arrangements for the first Sunday of the Month. First it was wonderful on 1st September to see 30 children at Messy Church each with parents or members of their families gathered as one with members from the Church and the Messy Church Team. Together we had over 70 people for the worship at 4.45pm and the tea that followed. One highlight for me was when we celebrated forthcoming birthdays. One family stepped forward with their little baby girl soon to celebrate her first birthday followed by Audrey who would soon be 94! How wonderful to have such a span of age worshipping God and enjoying each other's company. Secondly, I must add to the many words of appreciation that have already been spoken a great big thank you to our Flower Committee for the wonderful display within the Church which they prepared for Harvest which stirred our hearts to think of all that God gives and set the mood for our worship and act of thanksgiving.

Such a coming together of All Ages both at Messy Church and for Harvest reminds me how God rejoices in seeing us worship and pray together as his people. In the New Testament John the disciple who authored the Gospel and whose name is given to the letters of 1-3 John calls us as God's people into a welcoming and inclusive community where we can pray for one another, care for one another and love one another. You might say as Christians we are in every sense the 'community of one another' where all can find a home and where all can feel supported and valued. And such should ever be your experience in the life of the Church whether you are 1 or 94! Upon this theme I offer an invitation to you to join me in the Church Lounge on the mornings of Tuesday 22nd October and Tuesday 5th November when I shall lead two **Bible Studies** on the books of 1-3 John. In preparation for the first of these two meetings I invite you to read in its entirety the book of 1 John and for the second the books of 2 John and 3 John. We also in October look forward to hosting the President of the Methodist **Conference** Rev Ruth Gee on the morning of 15th October. The President of Conference is a person appointed by the annual Methodist Conference to represent and encourage the Methodist Church throughout Great Britain. Please come along at 10.00am when coffee will be served.

Finally, the process to appoint my successor from September of 2014 continues and I ask your prayers for the Church and Circuit Stewards involved in this process. An appointment would be expected to be made sometime between November and January. I have also been firming up plans for my Sabbatical between January and March of next year. I hope in this period to evaluate a number of resources I might use in my future ministry, to look at some places where the Church is growing, to have a period of retreat after what will be 20 years either in training or in the active work as a minister, and to undertake a visit and pilgrimage to Rome. During my Sabbatical Rev Angie Hoare will be offering ministerial cover in my place.

We further remember Angie at this time as she recovers from hip surgery and wish her and Gary well, and remember in our thoughts and prayers the Rev Denise Yeadon following the recent passing of her husband Clive. God uphold and sustain both Angie and Denise at this time and all in need in the life of our Church and in the wider community.





All Hallows Eve

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1 November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

The healing power of laughter

The health benefits of laughter have become widely recognised in recent years. People feel less pain after a good laugh because (research suggests) it releases chemicals that act as a natural pain-killer.

Physical benefits of laughter have been found to include a drop in stress hormones and less risk of heart disease. Mental and social benefits include less anxiety and stress, improved mood and enhanced group bonding.

Humour helps us to keep a positive outlook in difficult situations, disappointments and loss. More than that, laughter gives us the courage and strength to find new sources of meaning and hope. It really is contagious – just hearing laughter primes your brain and readies you to smile. It dissolves distressing emotions. You can't feel anxious, angry or sad when you are laughing.

Humour gets you out of your head and away from your troubles. Infants begin smiling during the first weeks of life and laugh out loud within months of being born. But you can learn to laugh at any stage of life. Smiling is the beginning of laughter. It can help to set aside special times to seek out humour and build from there. Pay attention to children and emulate them. They are experts on playing, taking life lightly and laughing.

The old advice to "count your blessings" will distance you from negative thoughts. When you hear laughter, move towards it. Share your embarrassing moments. The best way to take yourself less seriously is to talk about times when you took yourself too seriously.

I will hold the Christ-light for you in the night-time of your fear; I will hold my hand out to you, speak the peace you long to hear.


I will weep when you are weeping; when you laugh I'll laugh with you; I will share your joy and sorrow till we've seen this journey through.
