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Word from the Minister

Dear Friends

An angel said to them 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the City of David a Saviour has been born to you. He is Christ the Lord. Luke 2 vv 10-11

Christmas Starts with Christ is the strapline this year for the annual national advertising campaign organized by Churches and Christian Agencies across the United Kingdom. And interestingly this year Bristol has been targeted as one of the key cities meaning that all around the city you should find billboards emphasizing this message.

It is of course a message that reminds us that whilst there are many things we enjoy about Christmas from a Christmas Meal with family and friends to decorating the tree to opening presents and singing carols none of this would have been possible but for what happened in the small then unknown village of Bethlehem just over 2000 years ago. For there as witnessed by humble hill shepherds in what was probably a cave that doubled as a stable to winter some animals a young couple with little money to spare and struggling to make ends meet welcomed into the world their son whom God had named to them also as his own.

This was the miracle of incarnation, of 'God become a Man', what Charles Wesley in one of his several hymns written for the season described as ... 'Our God contracted to a span incomprehensibly made man'. Here was God in human flesh and bone vulnerable to the uncertainties of the world as much as ourselves. Here was God truly Immanuel which means 'God with us'. Here was God in Christ come to tread the same path as we and in so doing to go before us. Here was God sharing our human life making our salvation possible. The incarnation reminds us we are never alone. We have a God who has walked in our shoes and one who can help us as the hymn affirms through all the changing scenes of life. In addition we recognize in the words of one of the Early Church Fathers that 'Christ became like us that we might become like Him', in other words we might in following him embrace with him that life which is good and true, that life which is marked by holiness and grace.

Yes, Christmas starts with Christ, and this is why we must speak by our words and our actions of its true meaning to our families, neighbours and friends and give space amidst the festivities for opportunity ourselves to give thanks in worship, in prayer and in song both in private and public devotion. So let us indeed give thanks that 'Cradled in a manger meanly lay the Son of Man his head'. He comes to save and to liberate, to heal and to bring peace, to lift up the broken hearted, to give life in all its fullness and to lead us from darkness to light. And most precious of all He who is born for us and whose birth marks the true start of Christmas is the one that can give us all a new start in life if we but open our hearts to receive him in as Lord and Saviour.

Mindful of such things I therefore very much look forward to sharing and celebrating Christmas with you. And please also do not forget the Covenant Service on January 6th as we join with Methodists since 1755 in committing ourselves anew to God at the beginning of a New Year. We also hold in our thoughts especially at this time of year members of our Church and wider community who are housebound, those who are unwell or in hospital, those who have been recently bereaved and all who have need of our prayers. We have hope and peace in the love that binds us and in the Saviour who is born for us. I thank you for your support through 2013 and pray that you with me this sacred season may know the hope and the peace that Christ gives. For unto us and for the world a child is born – Immanuel – God with us! Let our voices be raised in thanksgiving and let us insure that we proclaim to the world that 'Christmas starts with Christ'.

Stationing and Sabbatical Update

First, to inform everyone that we were not matched with a minister to succeed me next September in the first round of stationing in November. I was offered an appointment in Bramhall south of Manchester but following the visit felt with the receiving Churches that this might not be the right appointment at this particular time. I now go forward to the second round of stationing and await the next appointment presented to me following the meeting of the Stationing Matching Group on 2nd and 3rd December. It would also be our hope that following this meeting a minister is invited to

look at the Hanham and Unity Oldland appointment. Please continue to hold all involved in this process in your prayers especially our Circuit stewards and Claire as our senior steward. If the second round of stationing is unsuccessful in matching a minister to us we will await the third and final round of stationing which will take place in January. I naturally also welcome your prayers as my future is determined.

Secondly, as you are aware I am on Sabbatical between January and March. A Sabbatical is a gift of time from the Church given to a minister. In the Methodist Church this gift translates into a three month period, and is taken after the minister's first ten years in ministry and thereafter every seven years. This will be my second Sabbatical and during this period I will be released from my normal duties in order to find refreshment and renewal in rest, areas of interest, study, training, opportunity for reflection and practical engagement. My plans at this stage include a pilgrimage to Rome, some visits to various Churches to consider methods of outreach, consideration of a variety of resources now utilized by Churches to encourage growth in discipleship, some further reading on Islam which is something I explored during my last sabbatical, and some time spent on retreat as I reflect on twenty years in ministry, the first three years in training and the following seventeen in the active work. During my Sabbatical Rev Angie Hoare will be giving Pastoral Oversight to Hanham and matters of pastoral need and concern should in the first instance be communicated to Claire Angell our senior steward. Finally, it is worth saying that in many ways a Sabbatical can be an opportunity not only for the minister but also for the Church to grow and develop. I pray indeed that my Sabbatical in 2014 will see us both mutually gain and I shall look forward to my return in April to share its fruit and share my final Easter and months with you before my move next summer.

Alice Grace Carter's Thanksgiving Service

One of Andrew's first duties as a new minister at Hanham Methodist in September 2005 was to preside over the funeral of Lilian May Blackmore, my Nan. Since then, Andrew has had what I suspect is a disproportionately large number of ceremonial duties in respect of the Blackmore family. We have had funerals for my Dad, Uncle Don, Ted, my Granddad, and his sister, Dorothy, but there have also been happier Blackmore-centric occasions at the Church in this time: Don and Dot's special wedding celebration, and my Harry's Thanksgiving Service.

The event that, I think, is likely to be the last of the Blackmore 'do's during Andrew's tenure at Hanham, Alice's Thanksgiving, took place on 27 October. By a complete, but still very satisfying, coincidence, this would have been Lil's 96th birthday so that the first and last of our events were, in some way, tied together. It is fitting, I think, that it should have been a joyful occasion, only sad at all in the sense that some who ought properly to have been there, could not be. The Blackmores - and, by necessity, those who choose to join with them - are a predominantly upbeat, and essentially stoic lot: it would have been entirely wrong somehow to end with anything teary. Alice is calm, and beautiful, and patient, and joyous – nothing sad about that.

The service was everything we could have wanted it to be. Our favourite moments? Probably Harry's impromptu, 'Hello Everyone' and Alice clapping the puppets. We are very very grateful to Andrew for accommodating our less than orthodox plans for the ceremony, and to the whole of the Church for allowing him to allow us to put those plans into action; and, to those of you who attended the service, for supporting our family. Many of our friends and family, who had not been to Hanham before, have commented to us on the warm welcome they received. David said in his speech-ette after lunch in Room 4 how this approach reflected the best of Christianity, a properly Christian attitude. I agree.







Following the Dream

My husband Pete and I met in Liverpool during the City's hey days of the mid 1960s. He was a Navigating officer in the Merchant Navy, whilst I was studying there at a Teacher Training College. Before the end of the decade, we were married, but I really disliked being left alone, whilst Pete was at sea, so eventually he gave up the job he loved, seeking employment ashore. Within three years of our wedding, we had become proud



parents to both our daughter Karen and son John, there being just eighteen months between them. Whilst enjoying the following twenty or so years, a busy yet truly happy time, bringing up our family, we both were determined there would still be life for us, when our youngsters had grown and fled the nest. So it was, with them both married by our mid fifties, plans rapidly formulated for our early retirement and 'following the dream'.

I had always wanted to spend time cruising the English Canal system in our own narrow boat, whilst Pete, still with the sea in his blood, longed to sail to the Mediterranean in our 32 foot sailing boat 'Wandering Star'. Between us, a deal was struck, we would do both!

At this time I was a Primary School teacher with over thirty years service, involved in many aspects of school life. In my private life, having a passion for music, I belonged to a large Bristol choir, in addition to being, an active member of Hanham Methodist Church. My life was very full, I had many acquaintances, some really good friends, a lovely sister, wonderful daughter, son and three year old grandson. Could I really leave all this, to become a water-borne traveller. It was good to have dreams, but as plans started turning to reality, with them came more and more concerns and anxieties.



Despite the worries and doubts, on the 1st February 2001, we moved out of our bungalow in Longwell Green, and aboard our brand new 60 foot

narrow boat "Free Spirit". We had bought her as a mere steel shell twelve months earlier, fitting her out ourselves, during the intervening months. We were so proud taking up residence, in what was to us, such a superb home. We had decided to rent out our bungalow, but being fortunate that the agents had found a tenant within only a week, it was necessary for us to remove from it all our personal belongings. Oh how I well remember, packing up and deciding what I could take aboard, there was no room for unnecessary clutter and I can hear Pete even now saying "Never mind whether you use it, do you need it?" Obviously many things could not go with us, but some being too precious or sentimental to discard, they were placed safely "in store".

Then followed a hectic period entertaining friends and family aboard, saying our farewells, before eventually casting off from our berth at Phoenix Wharf, Keynsham, to cruise the English Canal System. The following two and a half years was a truly remarkable and wonderful experience, during which we covered the great majority of the system. We frequently welcomed friends and family aboard, celebrated the birth of our second grandson and enjoyed every day of our stress free lifestyle, but the joint deal had been struck, so at the close of 2003 'Free Spirit' was placed on the market and remarkably sold within two weeks!

As we heralded in 2004, it was time for plans of the Mediterranean adventure to begin. We had sold our sailing boat "Wandering Star", prior to cruising the canal system, now with the sale of "Free Spirit" having been completed so swiftly and tenants still occupying our bungalow, we were homeless! A caravan was quickly purchased as a temporary home, allowing us to tour the country looking for the right boat for the sea cruising. We lived in the caravan for a few months, before eventually finding the boat which filled all our criteria.

"Market Lady" is a Vancouver 32, renowned cruising yachts with an excellent reputation for their sea kindly characteristics, we became the proud owners by the close of March 2004.

Our first years cruising aboard her was to be in local British and North French waters, familiarizing ourselves with her, whilst discovering any alterations we might wish to make during the winter of 2004/2005. We both thoroughly enjoyed the year, yet, whilst absolutely convinced "Market Lady" had been the perfect choice, at this stage I really could not imagine, ever sailing to the 'Med', it was only other women I thought, with far more guts and sailing experience than me, that made it - **that far!**

That winter, we lived aboard in Falmouth Yacht Village and it was great. We both signed on with a local employment agency, working to assist the budget for our proposed alterations and equipment we wanted, for "Our Lady". I regularly attended and sang in the choir of Falmouth Methodist Church where I made many new friends, and was privileged to sing with choirs from all over Cornwall, in Truro Cathedral. As winter turned into spring we commenced preparing ourselves and "Market Lady" for our departure to the Mediterranean, but I was becoming more and more mindful of how I could happily have stayed in Falmouth, living aboard "Market Lady", in the relative safety of this beautiful harbour.

With the end of May approaching visits to see our family were arranged, a very emotional time for me, before finally taking our leave of Falmouth, at midday on the 11th June 2005.

I was very apprehensive, yet equally excited as we let go our lines. I knew our boat would always take care of us and Pete was so encouraging, caring and such wonderful company. As sunset approached on this first day at sea, we prepared "Our Lady" for her night crossing of the Channel. The coastline of Cornwall was fast fading to the north and I began to relax, realising this was going to be an amazing adventure.

Pete and I had planned our route together, necessitating of course, such places as Finisterre, The Atlantic coast of Portugal, Cape St. Vincent, the notorious Bay of Biscay, and many more. These areas conjured within me, anxiety and fear. BBC Shipping Forecasts, I could hear them in my head, "Biscay, Finisterre, gale 8 rising to severe gale 9". Had I ever heard of good weather forecast for these places?

As it turned out, the three day Biscay crossing was amazing. We held two hour watches during the nights, my confidence growing with each passing

hour. We were accompanied by dolphins, but otherwise had the Bay to ourselves. Approaching North Spain visibility was poor, we could not see the rugged mountainous coastline much before we reached the Ria entrance. On doing so, our welcome was loud - a terrific thunderstorm with a cold strong westerly wind kept us on our toes, for about thirty minutes, conditions were quite unpleasant. As the squalls passed, we found ourselves a comfortable spot to anchor at the head of the Ria, an easy row in the dinghy to the town Quay.

We were elated! Whilst sitting in the cockpit enjoying a celebration drink, we sent text messages to our family, notifying them of our safe arrival. We really did feel on top of the worldWE HAD MADE IT, WE HAD CROSSED THE DREADED BAY OF BISCAY IN A LITTLE 32FT BOAT. For me this was a real milestone. Whilst I know many people have made this trip before me



and many will to do so again, I never really believed I could ... but I had.

Sailing onwards, La Coruna was an interesting vibrant City which we loved, our time there a contrast to the peace and beauty of Aries, Camarinas, Muros and Islas de Cies. The infamous Cape Finisterre, never since leaving Falmouth had the seas been as calm, again, a real high.

The final port in North Spain, Bayona, similar in many ways to La Coruna but smaller, was lovely. Reaching Portugal, a most exciting sail up the River Tejo, into Lisbon was a highlight, before continuing southwards to Sines. Years previously, whilst enjoying a package holiday on the Algarve, we had visited Cape St Vincent, which we had to round before reaching Lagos. Never in my wildest dreams could I have imagined then, sailing



round the Cape in our own boat. Once more, idyllic conditions, sailing in a force 4 westerly wind in brilliant sunshine with dolphins to guide us.

Arrival at The Algarve, our destination for 2005, represented an amazing achievement for me. With Pete's enthusiasm and

encouragement I had ventured further in our own boat than I had ever

thought possible. After visiting Lagos, Portimao, Albufeira and Villamoura, we settled in Faro Lagoon to welcome aboard our family, enjoying with our Grandchildren, snorkelling, swimming, paddling, shell collecting and sand castle building. Friends who had visited in Falmouth before we left, again visited in Faro.



Throughout the whole trip, by the wonders of modern communications, we had kept in constant touch with all those folk I was so concerned about leaving behind. They were very much with me every step of the way.


your Bible, but I'm disappointed you haven't had your hair cut."
