RIVERS OF THE BIBLE

Exodus 2: 1-10

The closing 14 chapters of Genesis tell the gripping story of Joseph, the young Hebrew boy, sold into slavery by his brothers who rose to become Pharaoh's second in command over the whole of Egypt. So grateful was the Pharaoh to Joseph for saving the country from seven years of famine by his ability to interpret dreams that he invited Joseph's family to move to Egypt to avoid the famine that had also hit Canaan.

Time had now moved on. The Pharaoh of Joseph's time was long dead and Joseph's great work had been forgotten. Over the years the Hebrew people had grown in number and the current Pharaoh felt threatened by their presence fearing they might take up arms against the Egyptians. So he decreed that the numbers be contained by ordering that every new born Hebrew male be thrown in the Nile.

One woman, Jochebed, driven by her strong maternal instincts hid her baby in a basket, waterproofed with tar, placed among the reeds on the banks of the Nile. The story tells us that Pharaoh's daughter came down to the river to bathe and spotted the basket with the baby inside. At that point Jochabed's daughter Miriam appears and cleverly offers the child's own mother as a wet nurse. So the babe was saved and moved into Pharaoh's palace.

The Princess names the babe Moses because he was 'taken from the water' and so begins the story of the great liberator, lawgiver and prophet of the Hebrew people, who led them from the slavery of Egypt into the Promised Land.

So following on from the River of Creation we have the River of Salvation. And salvation is a theme that we find running right through scripture. Even earlier than the Moses story we find God saving the life of the young Isaac from Abraham's knife. Further on in the Old Testament we find Elijah saved from starvation by the widow of Zarapeth. Then after 50 years or more in exile God leads his people away from incarceration in Babylon back to Jerusalem.

But it is in the New Testament that we find the matter of salvation most fully expressed. Despite the pleadings and warnings of a great line of prophet's the Hebrew people could never fully be at one with God. As the parable of the absentee landlord (Mark 12:1-8) reminds us the servants sent to the vineyard were ill-treated by the tenants and eventually the landlord sent his own beloved son who the tenants murdered. The parable clearly points to Calvary and the death of Jesus which Christians see as the pinnacle of God's work of salvation (1 Peter 2:24).

But the Bible is also clear that the doctrine of Salvation is more than just the saving of the individual for the promise of heaven. There is a much larger picture of salvation painted in the Bible. It describes the whole of creation being restored and reconciled to God. Paul writing to the Ephesians says'...that the universe and everything in heaven and on earth, might be brought into a unity in Christ' (Eph. 1:10).

More than 1000 years ago the Celtic Church recognised that creation and redemption were interwoven and that is why the Celtic cross has a cross within the circle. The circle represents the whole of creation and the cross the salvation of the whole.

O unexampled love,

O all-redeeming grace!

How swiftly did you move

To save a fallen race!

What shall I do to make it known

What you for all the world have done?

What a Month is May!

May 10th is Ascension Day, the 40th day of Easter. This is one of the earliest Christian festivals dating back to 68 AD. According to the New Testament, Jesus met several times with



his disciples during the 40 days after his resurrection to instruct them on how to carry out his teachings. On the 40th day he took them to the Mount of Olives, where they watched as he ascended to heaven.

May 13th - 19th is Christian Aid Week, an annual fundraising drive



by Christian Aid, which works with 700 local organisations across 50 developing countries. Working with poor communities, it trains people to deal with the effects of climate change and

prepares them for the threat of natural disasters, as well as providing training and education, health and sanitation, peace and reconciliation.


May 20th is Pentecost, celebrating the gift of the Holy Spirit, fifty days after Easter, when Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to his disciples to help them in their faith, and continue their work of establishing the church and spreading the gospel further. The word "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word "pentekoste," which means "fiftieth."

May 20th is also Aldersgate Sunday, a commemoration of an event in 1738 when John Wesley attended a group meeting in Aldersgate, London, and received an experience of assurance of

his salvation. This was a pivotal event in Wesley's life.

May 24th is Wesley Day – on May 24th, 1783, John Wesley's heart was "strangely warmed" because of the realisation of salvation through grace and only by grace, and so is often heralded as the day the Methodist movement was born.

27th Trinity Sunday Pope Gregory IX instituted Trinity Sunday in 828 AD. This day is dedicated to the Christian belief in the Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – and falls on the Sunday following Pentecost each year.




Signposts
